Design can improve environment

Modern Atlanta has become synonymous with its annual house tour, which showcases the city's best and coolest in sustainable, modern design. But what you may not know is what is beyond the organization's mainstay event: a lot.

What began just three years ago as a weekend house tour has quickly transformed into a weeklong celebration of a philosophical movement, its organizers say.

Modern Atlanta's "Design Is Human" week runs today through Sunday and features a variety of events, including exhibitions at the High Museum; showroom events at places such as Room & Board; film screenings; and lectures by design leaders such as Walter E. Miller, senior vice president of John Portman & Associates, and Kai-Uwe Bergmann of Copenhagen, Denmark-based firm BIG.

We spoke with Modern Atlanta's Elayne DeLeo, who co-founded the organization with Bernard McCoy, about Modern Atlanta's evolution.

Q: What is Modern Atlanta really about?

A: Modern Atlanta is really an organization that is dedicated to promoting design and educating the public about the benefits of design, how it improves one's life and the environment. It's all about engaging people in discussion and deeper thought about what it really means.

The first event we did was a home tour. And we decided at that point to take it a step further and move it beyond architecture and make a multilayered event that educates about all layers of design ... architecture, communication, fashion, interior design and visual arts and

It's about the process.

Q: What are some of your favorite examples of smart design in Atlanta?

A: A great example is what they've done at White Provision, which is where we are hosting our event. It's ... an existing structure in Atlanta that was thoughtfully remodeled and redesigned to add modern elements, while respecting the building's bones. ... There are a lot of empty buildings in Atlanta that could be looked at for new spaces.

Q: With all the events, lectures and movies during Modern Atlanta, what do you want people to take away?

A: I think, in general, people tend to think of design as the aesthetics or beauty of an object, or how great a couch or chair might look. Really, the beauty of design is in the function of it and the process of how it was developed. People don't see design as something that can improve a life or improve a community or the world in general. Design is what will get us to that place, and that is what takes us forward in life.
